A "New Coordinators Meet and Greet" will take place prior to the start of the New Coordinator's Workshop so that we can get acquainted. If you are around, please stop by and introduce yourself to the new coordinators.

Other planned sessions will include the return of **Dr. Robert Rhodes** from the American Board of Surgery. Dr. Rhodes will provide us with an update on verification of ABS roster, the need for verification of training when residents have been in more than one program, early entry of operative data into the ACGME SOL and more. **Barbara Gerkens**, Examination Coordinator, from the ABS will provide information on *Reviewing the application for the QE - what the ABS looks for*. The Steering Committee is pleased to have **Kerry Richards** return to speak about Visa issues. **Eleanor FitzPatrick** will return from the ECFMG to round out the visa programming. Two hours have been scheduled for each of these speakers to ensure enough time is available for

Breakout sessions will include "WEB ADS-Preparing the PIF part I"; "General Surgery Program Requirements Review"; and "Enhancing Your Professional Writing Skills". An update from a STAC representative on coordinator certification, *Current Surgery Program Coordinator's Corner*, and the results of the most recent coordinator salary survey are also scheduled. We have brought back by popular demand, "Coordinator's Jeopardy" to add a little humor and fun to the meeting.

Several ideas for new topics were submitted this year. I am happy to say that a session entitled "Finding Money for Your Residency Program" will be presented this year. Many of you over the years have asked how can I get money for my program? Perhaps this session will answer many of your questions. Also included this year will be a session entitled "Interview Selection: Does the ERAS application predict the applicant's successful completion of the surgical curriculum?"

From the competency side a session entitled, "Morbidity and Mortality Analysis: Relationship to the Core Competencies" will further enhance the programming. This year our webmaster **Maggie Tarpley** has offered to share with us the results of a study she and Dr. Tarpley presented at an international meeting earlier this year. "Locating, Evaluating and Utilizing Reliable On-Line Health Information" is sure to be a hit.

Another professional development session presented by **Pam Rowland, PhD** and **June Cameron** on "Developing Communication Intelligence: A Behavioral Approach for Coordinators" will be offered. Last year a session on professional development delivered by **Ruth Nawotniak** and **Ellie Gray** was a huge success.

I am also pleased to announce that **Tom Richter** from the ACGME Surgical Operative Log team will provide an update, discuss upcoming changes, and answer questions

or concerns you may have about the current reporting system.

In closing, I am very sad to say goodbye to Doris Stoll. Dr. Stoll has been the Executive Director for the RRC for Surgery since June 2001. Over the years, she has been a huge supporter of ARCS and has always encouraged us to be the best we can be. The phrase "Shut the door! ### *New ARCS Committees*

At the Chicago planning session the Steering Committee agreed that introducing some ARCS committees would be a move forward to increasing the involvement of our membership to grow and improve our association. These committees will enable you to get more involved in ARCS and contribute something to the Association as well as adding a layer of professionalism for yourself.

- **Current Surgery Review Board** -- Last year at the Spring conference, Ruth Nawotniak, MS, C-TAGME introduced “Current Surgery Program Coordinator’s Corner.” Ruth stated that this was an opportunity for coordinators to write an article for publication furthering our professionalism. This committee is responsible for reviewing and editing articles submitted by coordinators for possible publication in Current Surgery. - **Salary Survey and Job Description Reviewers** -- This committee is designed to take on the responsibility of reviewing and updating the program coordinators position annually. Our positions change and grow each year, and it is not unreasonable to think that several job descriptions could be written because of the diversity and level of responsibility differences that appear in our positions from

program to program. A salary survey should be completed approximately every three years and reported to ARCS, either in the ARCS Newsletter or as a presentation at the ARCS Spring meeting. As more coordinators become certified and as we become more involved in committees, either with ARCS or with our hospital system or community, we need to maintain a job description that clearly defines the knowledge, skills and abilities of a coordinator for a general surgery program as well as salary ranges. - **Rotating Curriculum Committee** -- This committee will help develop a rotating curriculum for the annual Spring meeting. Each year the Steering Committee depends on submissions of abstracts to build the programming for our conference. Some sessions like the RC Surgery, ACGME, or ABS update will be in the programming each year. Other topics will rotate on a two to three year basis. The Association has voiced the importance of more professional development sessions at our conference. Having a balance between necessary topics, coordinator abstracts, and personal professional development sessions would ensure a well-rounded conference for everyone. The best way to accomplish this goal is to have a committee tasked with the research and development of topics and ideas. The Committee will submit a report to the President of ARCS prior to the annual fall planning session for review and consideration of possible topics, their content or objective, and suggested presenters. ### *Current Surgery - Coordinators' Corner*

The first year of coordinator manuscript submissions to Current Surgery is coming to an end. It was a very successful year. There were articles in 5 of the 6 issues, and the missing issue was due to an oversight by the publisher.

As of the first of December 2006, there have been 10 manuscripts submitted to the ARCS Current Surgery Editorial Board authored by 8 different coordinators. Four of those manuscripts are in the final stages of review by the ARCS editorial board and will be submitted to Current Surgery for their review.

This is a wonderful opportunity for coordinators to share their experiences and knowledge. The ARCS Editorial Board is there to give guidance, help, suggestions and comments as necessary. The anonymity of both the author and the reviewer is protected. Any coordinator who manages a general surgery residency is welcome to submit, and can submit more than one manuscript. As
