We will be presenting a workshop entitled "Residency Program Interviews - the Keys to Success". The "Residency Program Interviews - the Keys to Success" workshop Goals and Objectives are as follows:

Participants in this workshop will be provided with an overview of the surgical residency program interview process. Discussion and review of all aspects of this process will take place from the initial application phase to the actual interview. Students will participate in an actual interview session which will provide them with an "inside" view of the interview day. Representatives from Community and University Programs will be involved to answer questions and facilitate this workshop. Other areas that will be reviewed include: overview of community vs. university program, tips on how to get started choosing a program, program list – how many are enough, writing a personal statement, review of interview questions, description of the typical qualities of a selected interviewee and what criteria is looked for, the role of professionalism when interviewing, review of the ten pitfalls when applying, the coordinator's role, aftermath – the rank order list meeting.

We will be meeting in August to review all your evaluations and suggestions for topics for the 2009 meeting in Salt Lake City, Utah – April 28, 2009 to May 2, 2009. Please think about submitting an abstract and presenting at the ARCS Conference. We would love to hear your ideas and/or something that you are doing in your program that might help other coordinators. I also invite you to apply to become a member of the Steering Committee – being a member of the Steering Committee is educating, fun, a way to meet other coordinators, builds confidence, and also adds to your resume.

Mentorship Program

Beginning a new job can be very stressful, especially the role of surgical residency coordinator. Believe it or not - I can remember 20 years ago, my first day on the job; I heard M & M and I was thinking plain or peanut...

As we all know, the surgical residency coordinator position is very demanding and detail oriented. In most cases, there is only one surgical residency coordinator per institution, and in some instances, only one surgical residency coordinator in the state. To provide support and lend a hand to new coordinators (<3 years experience), ARCS has established a mentor network. This support system was orchestrated to help new coordinators understand the many ACGME, ABS, and RRC requirements, and also to let them know that they are not alone in this endeavor. The mentorship program pairs seasoned Coordinators (>3 years experience) with new coordinators. The veteran and the inexperienced coordinator interact, exchange ideas, problem solve, determine answers to questions, make other acquaintances, and in many circumstances create friendships.


